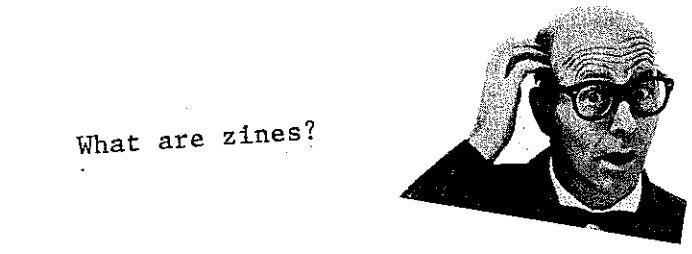

What are zines?

Zines are small-run, self-produced publications with DIY design.

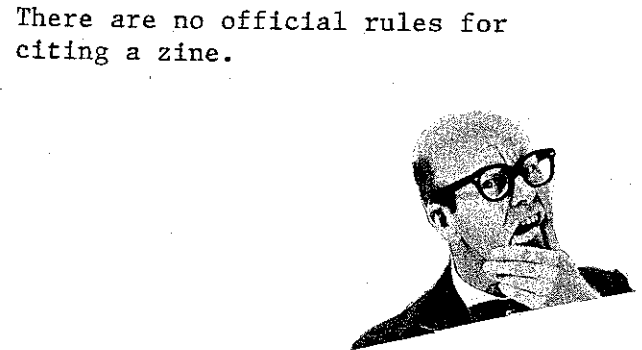
They are put out by ordinary people with something to say.



They are great primary sources for your research.

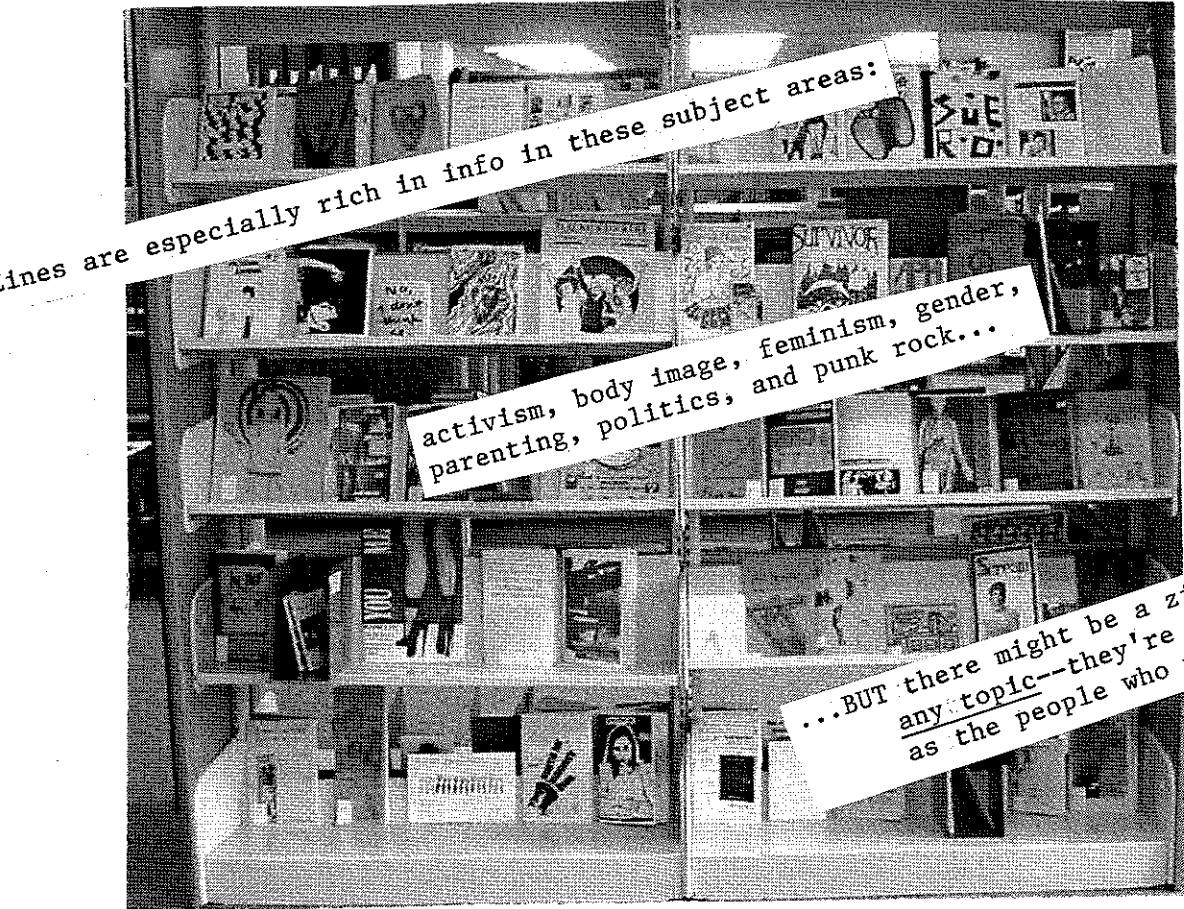


Go for that unique primary source!

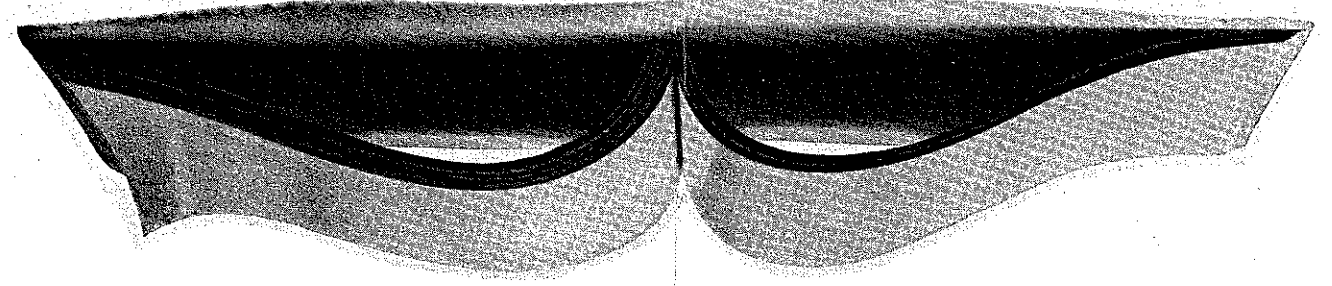


There are no official rules for citing a zine.

That won't stop you from quoting that great zine, will it?



Here are some guidelines:
 Include the word zine after the title in all citation formats.
 If a zine is missing citable information, leave those parts out of the citation.
 Cite authors within text the way you would cite a book.



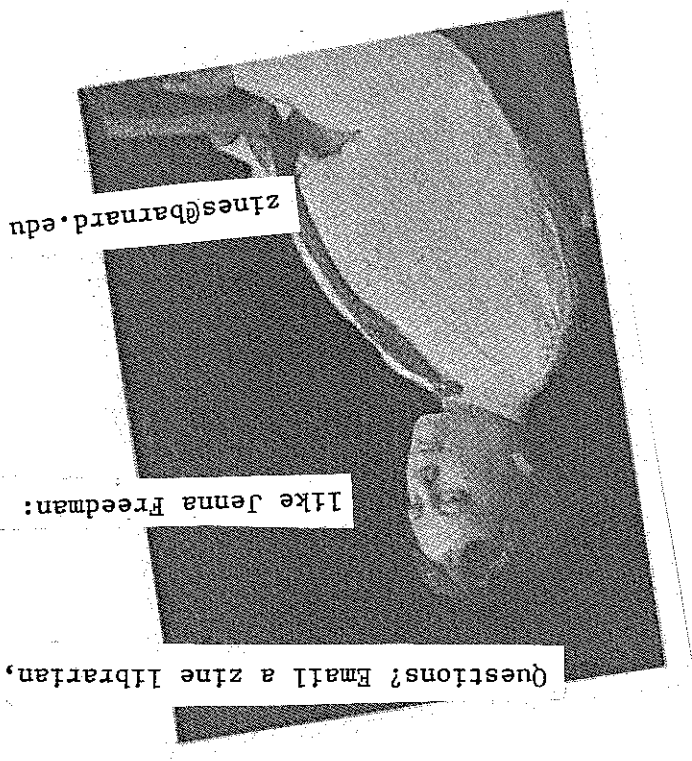
EXAMPLE FORMATS

MLA Last Name, First Name, Title [zine]. Volume #, Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication.

APA Last Name, First Initial, Middle Initial. (Year of Publication). Title [zine]. Place of Publication: Publisher.

CHICAGO Last Name, First Name, Title, Zine, Volume #, Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication.
