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## Featured Funders

### NASA—Not just for astrophysicists

There have been some interesting opportunities at NASA lately that seem to indicate that the agency is making more of an effort to broaden its reach beyond R1s to less commonly funded institutions. I want to talk about one of those opportunities today. But first, some history.

NASA was founded in 1958, in response to the U.S.S.R.'s successful launch of Sputnik I into space, but its roots go back much further to 1915, when in the midst of WWI, the U.S. government created the [National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics \(NACA\)](#), essentially by tacking on a rider to a Naval Appropriations Bill. If that sounds a little underhanded, that's because it was. President Taft had tried appointing a similar commission three years earlier, but the legislation formalizing it was shot down in Congress. But in 1915, with the support of Assistant Secretary of the Navy, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the guidance of [Charles Walcott](#), Secretary of the Smithsonian, and a little legislative skulduggery, NACA was officially formed with the mission to "supervise and direct the scientific study of the problems of flight with a view to their practical solution."

NACA still existed in 1957 when Sputnik I and Sputnik II were launched ([RIP, Laika](#)) and sent the U.S. government into a tizzy. By some accounts, the New York Times mentioned Sputnik in 279 articles between October 6th and October 31st, 1957, which amounts to more than 11 articles per day. Frantic at the thought of being technologically overtaken by the Soviet Union, a coalition of scientists, industrialists, and politicians agreed to create a new agency to replace NACA through the [National Aeronautic Space Act](#).

NASA recently announced a new program, "[Research Initiation Awards](#)," (RIA) aimed at expanding the number of researchers from institutions that typically receive less funding from NASA, including Primarily Undergraduate Institutions. Additionally, RIA seeks to "enable undergraduate students affiliated with the proposing investigator to perform cutting-edge research in an SMD-relevant field."

A wide range of projects are possible. The call only states that projects are:

expected to be relevant to the broad corpus of research sponsored by NASA's Science Mission Directorate, which is an integrated program that seeks to discover the secrets of the universe, to search for life elsewhere in the universe, and to protect and improve life on Earth and in space. SMD is organized into five interconnected divisions:

- **Astrophysics**
- **Biological and Physical Sciences**
- **Earth Science**
- **Heliophysics**
- **Planetary Science**

There are a few caveats. The "The PI may not hold any appointment at an R1 university. In addition, the PI of the proposal may not have received federal funding in the last five years as the PI of a project that is related to the proposed research activities."

NASA allows two exceptions to those rules.

"1) If the PI has previously received an RIA award, it is permissible to propose for an additional two-year RIA award for a total of four years of support.

"2) If the PI has received funding solely for the funding of students, e.g., through the FINESST program, it is permissible to propose to RIA."

**The maximum award amount is \$300,000 over 24 months. The deadline is July 18, 2023.**

## Sage Advice

### Course Releases

Last issue, we covered the first of two common requests in grants—summer salary. This issue, I want to discuss the slightly different issue of course releases. **A course release** buys out faculty time in order to pursue research or service projects. A course release *replaces* the funds the College would otherwise be paying for your time. It doesn't offer any additional compensation to the faculty member. **Course releases must be approved by your Chair and the Provost's office before submitting a proposal.**

**How to calculate a course release.** There's a persistent misconception that if you budget for a course release in a grant, you really only need to set aside enough money to hire an adjunct to teach your class. Not so!

A course release is buying out a portion of a faculty member's time. [Here's the official policy](#), available on the Provost's website:

The first course bought off is billed at the salary and benefit equivalent of half of the FTE of the course in question, i.e. a course for someone on a four course load is bought off from a grant at .125 FTE of salary and benefits (half of 0.25); a course for someone on a five course load is bought off from a grant at .10 FTE of salary and benefits (half of 0.2). Any course buy-out above the first one is bought at the full fractional FTE, i.e. .25 or .20. So, to buy out two courses on a four course load, .375 FTE. of salary and benefits should be budgeted.

So imagine you teach four courses a year, making \$100,000 as your base pay. \$100,000 isn't really what the College pays for your time. To figure that out, you need to factor in benefits, such as retirement contributions, health insurance, and so on. We call those benefits "fringe." So let's say that **your time = salary + fringe.**

Barnard's fringe rate is currently 37%. Put together with our hypothetical salary of \$100,000, that means the College pays \$137,000 for the PI's time per year. So one course release would be 12.5% of \$137,000, or \$17,125, if the PI teaches four courses per year.

What if the PI wanted a second course release in the same year? Well, the second course release is more expensive (or maybe we should say the first course release is subsidized by the College). That course release costs a full 25% of your time, which amounts to \$34,250 in our example. Added together, two course releases cost 37.5% of your time (12.5+25), which amounts to \$51,375.

**Fringe is set at different rates at different universities.** Don't assume that your collaborator charges the same fringe rate as Barnard! Your collaborator's Sponsored Research Office or HR office will be able to give you the number.

Say you get approval for a course release from your Chair and the Provost, you budget appropriately for it, and then you get the grant. You're still not done! You still need to initiate the transfer of funds from your grant to the College in Workday. Fortunately, this process is relatively straightforward.

- 1.Type "[Create Request](#)" in Workday Search Bar.
- 2.Select "**Accounting Adjustment Request**" from drop down menu and click "**OK**".
- 3.Complete all fields. This includes providing a description of request, attaching all relevant documents and answering all questions. **Use Box #2 to request transfer of course release salary and fringe.**
- 4.Click "**Submit**."

## The History of American Philanthropy

Last issue, we talked about Mary van Kleeck, a socialist, activist, scholar, and long-time leader at the Russell Sage Foundation. As I noted, she ended her life convinced that America should and eventually would jettison the sort of capitalism that made it possible for Russell Sage to pile up the enormous fortune that his widow eventually funneled into the Russell Sage Foundation. Charity was well and good, her thinking went, but it would be better still to arrange the economy in such a way that it wasn't necessary. This issue, I want to talk about Andrew Carnegie and his Gospel of Wealth as a way of thinking about some broader questions in the history of philanthropy. What did these rich men think they were doing in giving away their money? Why were they doing it? And how did the recipients react?

Truthfully, I was hoping research would dig up a few new fun facts about [Andrew Carnegie](#), like the time I learned that Johnny Appleseed was a Swedenborgian missionary, but the basic outline taught in school seems roughly correct. He was born in Scotland in 1835. His father was a weaver who struggled to find work. His mother supported the family by selling "potted meat." Eventually, the family moved to Pennsylvania to find work in 1848. Soon after, Andrew Carnegie started his first job at age 12, changing the spools of thread in a cotton mill for twelve hours a day. Soon after, he took a job at a telegraph office, then at a railroad company, working as the secretary for Thomas A. Scott.

At 24, Carnegie was promoted to superintendent and promptly hired his younger brother and his cousin. Though his salary started to pick up, he first started making real money when Thomas A. Scott, owner of the railroad company he worked at, helped guide Carnegie through early investments that today would be considered insider trading (though, of course, [most of the laws against insider trading](#) went into effect after Carnegie's death).

Carnegie's career really took off during the Civil War, when he was named Superintendent of the Military Railways and the Union Government's telegraph lines. Carnegie ran the railroads efficiently, then used his success as a platform to get into the production of iron, which was in high demand because of the war. Carnegie was enormously successful, in part because of technological innovations that allowed him to produce iron more cheaply, in part because of his adoption of "vertical integration" in his business (that is, the practice of owning an entire supply chain within one company), and in part because [price fixing among railroad and steel barons was rampant](#).

Eventually, J.P. Morgan bought Carnegie out as part of a plan to create a merger of railroads and steelworks, leaving Carnegie fabulously wealthy and effectively retired in 1901, becoming the richest man in the country. Throughout his years building his fortune, Carnegie also devoted himself to acquiring the type of education he had never had as a child and, in time, became a relatively well-known writer, in correspondence with figures ranging from Matthew Arnold to Mark Twain. It was during this time that Carnegie published his most famous work, "The Gospel of Work." It begins:

The problem of our age is the proper administration of wealth, so that the ties of brotherhood may still bind together the rich and poor in harmonious relationship. The conditions of human life have not only been changed, but revolutionized, within the past few hundred years. In former days there was little difference between the dwelling, dress, food, and environment of the chief and those of his retainers. The Indians are to-day where civilized man then was. When visiting the Sioux, I was led to the wigwam of the chief. It was just like the others in external appearance, and even within the difference was trifling between it and those of the poorest of his braves. The contrast between the palace of the millionaire and the cottage of the laborer with us to-day measures the change which has come with civilization.

Next issue, I want to spend some time unpacking the content of Carnegie's pamphlet and the spirit of his declaration that "The man who dies thus rich dies disgraced."

#### Revised Post-Submission Material Policy

Conferences are defined as public events that are

comprised primarily of oral and poster presentations to a larger audience of anthropologists. Priority is given to major conferences sponsored by large international anthropological organizations (e.g., the European Association of Social Anthropologists, European Anthropological Association, Pan African Anthropological Association, and Latin American Anthropological Association) that serve as their annual or periodic meetings. The majority of the funds granted to such conferences is expected to be used towards expenses for international scholars who are making presentations at the conference and would not otherwise be able to attend. Workshops are defined as working meetings that focus on developing and debating topical issues in theoretical anthropology. Workshops involve a small group of scholars who meet for a sufficient period of time to deal intensively with the topic. Priority is given to those workshops that devote the majority of time to discussion and debate rather than to the presentation of papers. It is expected that workshops will result in a publication."
