Featured Funder: Inside Tips for Securing Support from the Russell Sage Foundation

The Russell Sage Foundation (RSF), a pillar of American philanthropy since 1907, dedicates itself to "the improvement of social and living conditions in the United States." Their commitment to interdisciplinary knowledge translates into robust research support, and a great resource for faculty seeking funding for impactful projects. Fresh off our successful hosting of the 2023 CLASP Virtual Conference, where IFSR played a leading role, we're excited to share valuable insights from our RSF panel session featuring Stephen Glauser, Program Officer at RSF. Barnard's Mignon Moore, Ann Whitney Olin Professor of Sociology, Special Advisor to the Office of the President, and Elizabeth Ananat, Mallya Professor of Women and Economics, joined the conversation to share their experiences as reviewers and grantees of the Foundation. We hope this insider knowledge and key takeaways equips you to navigate the funding landscape at RSF with confidence:

- ⇒ An Interdisciplinary Approach Matters: RSF prioritizes projects that break disciplinary silos and foster collaboration across diverse fields. It's important that your proposal, particularly your literature review, demonstrates an understanding of how your topic is shaped by various fields and what contributions your project makes to the topic, not just your specific field. When possible and relevant, also think beyond your own department and seek collaborations with colleagues from other disciplines.
- ⇒ Your Audience will be Diverse: Remember, reviewers hail from various academic backgrounds. Because of RSF's interdisciplinary values, reviewers may all be experts on your topic, but may have approached the topic from varying disciplines and methodology. For example, while your project may center interventions to child poverty, remember that reviewers may be experts on child poverty from psychology, economic, political science, and sociological lenses. Craft your proposals in a way that resonates with a broad audience while showcasing the project's significance within your specific field.
- ⇒ Embrace Feedback: Take constructive criticism from reviewers seriously. It's an invaluable opportunity to refine your proposal and strengthen its potential whether the proposal is funded right away or not. Reviewers view a researcher's ability to receive feedback in the proposal stage as a signifier for their flexibility in later stages of the project.
- ⇒ Seek Guidance Early: Don't hesitate to reach out to program officers for initial discussions about your project and its fit for the Foundation's priorities. Our hosted RSF Program Officer, Stephen Glauser, shared that he is often willing to have 15-30 minute meetings with applicants a month to a month and a half before the deadline.
- ⇒ **Take Resubmission Requests Seriously:** Don't be discouraged if you are not awarded funding right away. Many grantees who receive funding apply more than once for a grant. Always consider resubmitting, especially if you receive a request for resubmission. Reviewers often see potential in proposals but require further clarification or refinement. Consider resubmission an opportunity to address feedback with precision and strengthen your project's case.

The Russell Sage Foundation offers a variety of programs with annual funding cycles, including <u>Behavioral Science and Decision Making in Context</u>, <u>Future of Work</u>, <u>Immigration and Immigrant</u> <u>Integration</u>, <u>Race</u>, <u>Ethnicity</u>, <u>and Immigration</u>, and <u>Social</u>, <u>Political</u>, <u>and Economic Inequality</u>. History of Philanthropy: The History of Philanthropy Returns!

For those of you who don't know me, I'm Liane Carlson and up until this past June, when I went on parental leave, I was the author of this newsletter. I'm in a new role and the newsletter is now in Tashiana's capable hands, with one key exception: The History of Philanthropy column.

I started this column in <u>February 2021</u> as a pet project. I'm an academic by training, with a PhD in religious studies from our neighbor across the street. When I was still pursuing an academic role, my relationship to foundations and federal agencies was pragmatic. I wanted money and they had it. I stumbled into fundraising by accident, but the longer I was in this world, the stranger it started to seem.

Take postdocs. It's nearly impossible to get a faculty job these days without a postdoc, but postdoc positions are often funded by the government or by foundations, which means that our faculty pipeline is built in a very real way by a handful of unelected Program Officers and agency heads who decide what is worth funding. How did they get that power? Or politics. Philanthropies can't lobby on behalf of political candidates, but they can give millions to think tanks promoting climate change skepticism. Why? Those are a few of the questions that interested me and I'm not nearly done answering them.

For the first year, from February 2021 - April 2022, I focused on the legal history of philanthropy in the U.S. and its ongoing dialogue with English law. English charitable law has been intimately intertwined with the Crown's relationship to the Church since the Middle Ages. In the thirteenth century, that took the form of the <u>multiple mortmain (literally, dead hand) laws</u> Edward Longshanks passed, trying to limit the ability to leave property to the Church, where it would remain a non-taxable asset in perpetuity. Later, after <u>Henry</u> <u>VIII seized Church property</u> during the Reformation, his successors were forced to scramble to replace the Church's role as distributor of charity. The most important piece of legislation to come from that period was the <u>Charitable Uses Act of 1601</u>, which listed a very specific set of causes that could be considered charitable (<u>possibly by accident</u>). Crucially, religion was *not included, which went over about as well as you would think once the colonists seeking religious liberty tried <u>to apply them to their situation in North</u> <u>America</u>. There were many contentious court cases, once the Americans declared independence, trying to work out <u>whether British precedent applied</u>, what legal conditions had to be in place to leave money to an organization (i.e. <u>did it have to be incorporated</u>?), how specific donors needed to be in their directives, what happened if the initial intention was no longer possible to fulfill.*

The second tranche of columns deals with <u>the rise of scientific philanthropy</u> and the beginning of the big foundations. Scientific philanthropy defined itself in contrast to a patchwork of community-based charities that could be religious, ethnic, or national in nature. While charities were ad hoc and perpetuated poverty by giving aid on a case-by-case basis, philanthropy sought out the root causes of poverty, ignorance, and disease, and tried to rectify them–at least so the new philanthropists argued. I didn't want to simply accept the self-mythologizing of philanthropy, so the early months of this theme offered case studies of those community-based charities, such as how the <u>Cherokee and Choctaw people donated to Ireland during the</u> <u>Great Famine</u> and how the <u>Chinese-American community</u> on the West coast collected funds to help those in need, yes, but also to pay to ship the dead back to China for burial. I was just settling into the rise of the big philanthropies <u>during Reconstruction</u> and the Gilded Age, with discussions of <u>Russell Sage</u> and <u>Andrew</u> <u>Carnegie</u>, when I went on leave.

Now that I'm back, what can you expect?

- \Rightarrow More stories of the fortunes (and scandals) behind the big philanthropies
- ⇒ New stories about early ventures into international causes, such as the Carnegie Foundation's ill-fated study of white poverty in South Africa during the 1930s
- \Rightarrow Investigations into the rise of federal agencies
- \Rightarrow Anything else really juicy that I stumble across
